- Jane Tesner Kleiner: Change my mind based on evidenceYES! So many kids are concerned about observing things "wrong"
- Merrill David: Is that an erasable pen? Can you tell us what type it is?
- Olivia Wickett: If students have a hard time starting their page, how would you recommend we approach it? Tell them to write down observations using their 5 senses or maybe start by drawing?
- Sarah Hooghuis: I'm also curious about Olivia's question, but also how you might handle students who are anxious about messing up/making mistakes - I've done blind contours to help with that issue, but it comes up a lot with teens.

- Jane Tesner Kleiner: We did this with Jack in Vancouver with our educator training. He said to study our leaves for 12 minutes. At first, folks were like.....what can I spend 12 minutes.....but folks really got into it! And wanted more time. :) And yes, we all matched our leaves.
- Kathleen Bagot: Have been a participant in this activity multiple times and also run it multiple times - ALWAYS works. Some people doubt their efforts on the page, but this activity always delivers a shift in mindset of what they can do.

- Maeve Rafferty: This leaf game that you talked about, is this best for grades 3 and up? Thinking very young students may have difficulty with the detail.

- Alexus Hansen: in this game, do they sketch the plant also or just make notes/observations?
- Kathryn Reis: These activity ideas are phenomenal! Thank you!
- Teagan Roberts: This makes my eyes well with tears. Amazing! You have my attention.
- Judy Braus, NAAEE: Nature does all the work!
- Mike McDavit: Any tricks for college age students?
- Zaneta Trent: what if you have all teens and there is no snack? I have a very chatty group of teens that just want to socialize
